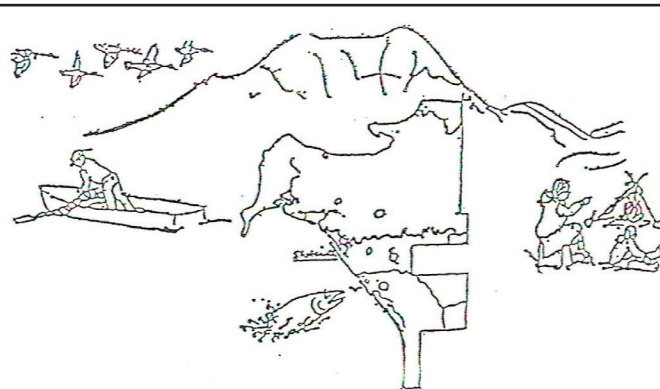

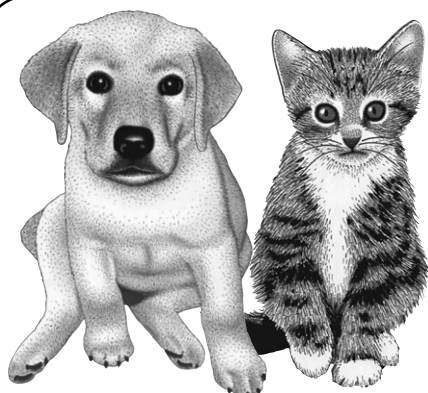

Documentary series depicts impact of loss of sea ice on Bering Sea residents

A three-part short documentary, entitled "After the Ice," explores the impact of the loss of sea ice on Indigenous communities in the region. The film, which was created in a partnership between sea ice scientists and the Bering Sea Elders Group, features several Bering Sea residents, including people from Golovin, Nome, Savoonga, Unalakleet and Wales.

As sea ice levels reach unprecedented lows, the documentary uses a collaborative approach to showcase the ways that climate change directly impacts Indigenous Alaskans due to the effects on subsistence. The underlying goal of the project is to show the impacts of climate change by including the voices and experiences of Indigenous elders.

Released earlier this month, the film is funded by the Study of Environmental Arctic Change, or SEARCH, a multidisciplinary effort led by Brendan Kelly of the University of Alaska Fairbanks's International Arctic Research Center. Beyond "humanizing" climate change, Kelly said another core mission of the project is to bring Indigenous perspectives — voices which have been overlooked for too long — into scientific conversations. According to Kelly, inspiration for the project began after SEARCH worked to include Indigenous knowledge in the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Association's annual Arctic Report Card. He realized that, while the NOAA report is a crucial step toward inclusion, a governmental report is unlikely to be widely read. To make the information more accessible, SEARCH reached out to video journalist Eli Kintisch, who produced the documentary.

Kelly said that the video medium is useful for two reasons: first, it includes first-hand accounts from Indigenous peoples experiencing climate change, and second, it allows scientists to make their findings more intelligible. "We're great at talking to each other," Kelly said of scientists, but as a whole the field is "underdeveloped" in making information available in a way that the general public and decision makers can understand.

It is vital that science be, in Kelly's words, "translated into English" because upon encountering theoretical data points about the warming climate, many people are left without a clear understanding of the practical implications. It follows that the videos, because they include first-hand experiences along with scientists, bring meaning to climate change in a way that pure data cannot.

As Kelly explained, "I can write as many scientific papers as I want, but I will never be able to bring a sense of consequences in the same way someone who is dependent upon the fish can." The Indigenous perspective fills in why people should care about climate change. Stories from Indigenous elders grab people's attention in a way that facts cannot, because most people are able to resonate with the need to feed a family. This is why, according to Kelly, it is necessary that people in the Lower 48 gain a more nuanced understanding of the way Indige-

nous peoples in the north live.

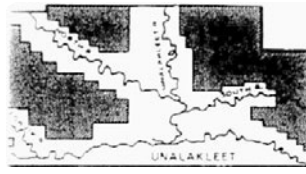
When it comes to addressing climate change, Kelly said, "We need all hands on deck" to engage with the issue. Synthesizing Indigenous and scientific knowledge in a way that people can understand is a crucial step toward encouraging engagement. To this point, Kelly emphasized that "After the Ice" is a "step, not an answer." The coproduction of knowledge is important because Indigenous elders provide a deep understanding and knowledge of an ecosystem that Kelly said most scientists "can only dream of." Arctic scientists have much to learn from Indigenous elders, who have lived in the region for decades and have an intimate and unparalleled understanding of the climate; a comprehension which allows them to recognize even seemingly minor environmental changes. It is particularly vital to document this understanding now, as climate change threatens the Indigenous culture itself.

In terms of the specific content of the documentary, the clips are each about seven minutes; the first is titled "Our Food," the second "Our Land" and the third "Our Story." The first segment includes Bering Strait residents speaking about the importance of subsistence and the way that the changing climate has impacted the animals people depend upon. As the video points out, this dependence is not only for physical nourishment, but also for the way of life and cultural identity. The threat climate change poses is therefore both literal and cultural.

"Our Land" details the vulnerability of Arctic communities and the problems with storms and erosion. Northern latitudes are some of the most impacted by the changing climate, and communities are forced to adapt and move as living in the current spot (a location where people have been for generations) becomes impossible. The last part of the documentary speaks to a more abstract vulnerability: the vulnerability of a culture. Elders relay their fear for future generations, who will live in a world with not only a very different climate, but one in which the subsistence practices that have sustained the culture for generations have become impossible.

As all this suggests, the overall tone of the documentary is one of serious concern in the face of an unprecedented crisis—concern about food security, the loss of a way of life and with it a culture. But there is also an undercurrent of hope. More than anything else, Kelly hopes people come away from the documentary with the understanding that "these are real people with real lives, who are threatened but adaptive and resilient."

The people of the Bering Sea region, the documentary emphasizes, are incredibly resilient. They have been forced to adapt in the past, and have always done so successfully. So, even facing a crisis of catastrophic proportions, the underlying message is that if anyone can overcome and survive, it is this culture. As Delbert Pungowiyi put it, despite everything, "We're still here, we're still who we are."
